

As we begin the days of September, many of the church leaders and the churches are beginning their efforts anew. Vacations for families and children have ended, and many pastors and church workers, too, have returned from their time away on vacation. Give thanks for these times of respite and relaxation. Pray now for these churches and for those who minister through them as they begin the efforts to share God's Good News with people who live around them.

Pray for the Board of Directors meeting which will be held on Tuesday, September 17. The Board and the staff of the DCBC are in final preparations for the Annual Gathering of the DCBC which will be held on October 24-25 at Clifton Park Baptist Church. The Board members will also be handling the questions regarding the leasing of the Johenning Baptist Community Center and the future of the Center's work. Give thanks for the service of the members of the Board of Directors this year and for its committees which have served faithfully across the period. Pray for the work of the Enlistment Com-

mittee as it completes the call of additional Board members to begin their service of the DCBC.

One of the concerns of the Board of Directors as we prepare for the Annual Meeting is the Statement of Resolve, an effort to let DCBC have a gathered voice on a major issue which confronts either our city or our society. This year we have focused on a Statement of Resolve about the nature of Truth. Seemingly, at the sources of many of our contemporary challenges is a slippery understanding of the concept of Truth. This necessarily affects the efforts of churches to share the Good News with other people. Pray for the Board of Directors and for the members of the DCBC as we consider a Statement of Resolve on the concept of Truth.

Several of our churches are rejoicing in the blessings which God has given them over the past months or is giving them in the present. One of our churches located far from the center of the DCBC is the Agape Bible Christian Fellowship in far off Martinsville, VA where Dr. Lee Hagwood serves as the pastor. This congregation has been looking for a home over many years, having started at least 17 years ago. They recently acquired a new place of worship, having received the blessing of a generous loan from a local bank in Martinsville. On the last Sunday of August, the church held a great celebration of dedication of the new church building. Rejoice with Agape in the blessing which God has given them. Pray for their future use of the building in Christian ministry within Martinsville.

Let us continue to pray for the Annual Gathering of the D.C. Baptist Convention. This last month and over the next two months individuals will be registering for the Annual Gathering. This year's Annual Gathering will be held in the Clifton Park Baptist Church on October 24--25. Pray for the meeting, for the vendors who will present their ideas and concept there and for the speakers who will address the convention members and the varied group members. Remember to lead your church to prayer for the Annual Meeting, as well.

Let us also give thanks for our national partner, the Progressive National Baptist Convention last month. Many of the pastors of the DCBC participated in the meeting last month. Also the PNBC provides annually the opportunity for laity to receive training and education for work within the local churches during the time that this national convention meets. Give thanks for the meeting of the PNBC.





Another of our national and international ties is the one with the North American Baptist Fellowship. The NABF is affiliated with the Baptist World Alliance and links together the conventions of the United States and also of Canada. Give thanks for the work of the NABF and its General Secretary, Rev. Jeremy Bell. The NABF will host its fall convocation in Falls Church, VA on October 1-2. Consider participating in this events and surely pray for the work of the NABF and for this meeting at the beginning of next month.

A partner with many of the churches of the DCBC is the Lott Carey Baptist Missionary Society which has its offices in Washington, D.C. Pray for the pastor of West Hyattsville Baptist Church whose pastor Rev. Emmitt Dunn has accepted a call to be leader of the Lott Carey Baptist Missionary Society. It will be interesting to see how the missionary society will seek to relate to the DCBC with these who have been deeply involved within our convention.

The DCBC continues to develop its ministry known as the Burma Work Group, one which focuses on the Baptist work in Myanmar. The work group is preparing for another teaching trip in early 2020, following up the one which we had this year. These trips have been catalysts to other American Baptists who are developing similar ministries within the country of Myanmar among the Baptists there. The Burma Work Group is also developing a ministry to children and youth who are in the immigrant churches within the United States. This ministry will address the spirituality of these children and the development of that spirituality. Pray for the pastors who are working on this project, which will help children and youth throughout the United States and possibly children and youth of Myanmar. Give thanks for the dedication of the members of the Burma Work Group to these tasks.

Let us begin to focus our prayers on the National Capital Area Offering, the NCAMO, also now known as "the Blessing." This is the month that we begin to seek a response to this offering. The offering focuses on new and important ministries of the DCBC. This covers all of our ministry areas including: Empowering Congregations, Engaging Communities, and Equipping Leaders as well as the areas of Administration and of Communications. Pray for the efforts to raise this offering as well as for the churches and the individuals who will give to it. Pray about your own response to the financial appear to support these varied ministries.

It is now this month that we begin our Grant Training Class at the offices of the DCBC. Pray for those who will attend the class and for the leader, Mr. Stephen Broyles of Howard University. Give thanks for those who have taken this class and for their future ministry in writing grants. This year we know that staff of the DCBC have participated in writing grants for a total of more than \$400,000 this year. Pray for God's grace upon those who are considering these grant proposals. Pray also for Mr. Broyles and for those who will take the grant writing class. We know already that some graduates from the class are writing grants to help their churches in finding resources for ministry.

Finally, we ask for your prayers as we seek a new occupant to the Johenning Baptist Community Center. The Early Childhood Academy which was an occupant for many years have secured their own building. Now we look for a new direction in the ministry at Johenning and for those who will occupy the building there as we continue to minister in that community of Ward 8.



D.C. Baptists are a people focusing on the mission of Christ. We have eleven churches among us made up of immigrants from Myanmar. These friends provide open doors to work among three people groups—the Chins, the Kachins and the Karens—where we worked in 2019. These funds will continue to help Baptists (pastors, leaders and seminary students), extending their ministries though teaching in the areas of Agriculture, Practical Theology and Social Work. Some of the funds will also be used to strengthen teaching efforts in the refugee camps and Sunday Schools among the Kachin people of Northern Burma.



Mental Health First Aid is a national program that teaches you how to identify, understand and respond to signs of mental illnesses and substance use disorders. The 8-hour certification course gives you the skills you need to reach out and provide initial help and support to someone who may be developing a mental health or substance use problem or experiencing a crisis.

Mental Health First Aid takes the fear and hesitation out of starting conversations about mental health and substance use problems by improving understanding and providing an action plan that teaches people to safely and responsibly identify and address a potential mental illness or substance use disorder.

The training is offered in two 4-hour sessions or one 8-hour session.





Earlier this year, in partnership with The American Baptist Foundation's Palmer Grant Program, we revised our Food Program Grants to hone our focus on the threefold methodologies of direct service, self-help, and structural change. To date we have awarded over \$10,000 in grants to assist DCBC member congregations and partners address food insecurity among the people they serve. A recent example of the impact this program is having comes from Mount Moriah Baptist Church who wrote:

The Deaconess Ministry of Mt. Moriah Baptist Church (MMBC), located at 1636 East Capitol Street N.E., Washington, DC 20003 oversees the MMBC Food Pantry. The MMBC Food Pantry is open on the fourth Thursday of each month, from 10:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The MMBC Food Pantry mission is to serve individuals at risk of hunger and food insecurity. MMBC realizes there are many persons, within our surrounding area, who do not have access to supermarkets and/or grocery stores and/or the means to have enough nutritious food consisting of fresh produce, dairy products, meats and breads, along with a wide range of canned goods that would aid them with having a healthy balanced life. We realize a lack of healthy, nutritious food is linked to numerous health problems that include diabetes and undernourishment amongst

other issues which put people impacted by hunger and/or food insecurity at a disadvantage of being able to thrive in so many ways. The MMBC Food Pantry is a source of free healthy and nutritious food to individuals within our own church neighborhood and beyond.

We also offer critical resources such as nutrition education, health screenings, and seasonal food baskets (Thanksgiving and Christmas) and back to school supplies.

The \$1,500 Food Grant received from the District of Columbia Baptist Convention will be used to help support the MMBC Food Pantry operation. Many of our clients are middle age (35 -50) men and women with children. However, in the past several months, we have seen an increase in the number of men coming to the Food Pantry and also an increase in seniors 70 and older.

Hunger Is a major concern among many American citizens today with unemployment, bankruptcy, and personal debt Increasing nationwide. People are finding it harder and harder to make ends meet. The MMBC Food Pantry is there to assist whenever and however we can.

Our Direct Service (Outreach Project) is provided to individuals In Ward 6and other wards in the District of Columbia. We pack food bags consisting of meats, mainly chicken and beef along with other wholesome food products, such as brown rice, brown spaghetti, macaroni, dry beans, green beans, peas, mixed vegetable, fruit and fresh produce. We try to ensure that each bag contains enough food that can be versatile and easy to prepare and store while at the same time provides protein, fiber, and vitamins for at least two-to-three meals. For the past several months, on average we have served approximately 40 -50 individuals in the two and half hour span that the pantry is open. In addition, the MMBC Food Pantry is also open doing the week as the need arises or upon request.

We are in partnership with the Capital Area Food Bank (CAFB) where we do on-line and on the floor shopping on a monthly basis. This partnership also helps us to purchase food at a reasonable cost. The \$1,500 Food Grant will help us to make more selection of items when shopping and will enable us to feed a greater number of persons in need.

Again, on behalf of Pastor Lucius M. Dalton and the Deaconess Ministry, we thank you for the approval of our application for food pantry funding.

"Most of the time the idea of apologetics is misunderstood because it sounds a lot like "apologizing" and for the Christian we have nothing to apologize for ! We love Jesus and we believe in God. Actually, apologetics may be simply defined as the defense of the Christian Faith. It is offering a reason for what you believe and why you believe it. The word apologetics is derived from the Greek word "apologia" which was originally used by a lawyer in the process of defending a client. In this workshop we will discuss how to respond to critics and how to present cogent arguments for the existence of God.



Carmel Baptist Church, National Baptist Memorial Church (which has a transitional pastor), Resurrection Baptist Church, Riverside Baptist Church, Spirit of Peace Baptist Church, True Gospel Baptist Church and Village Baptist Church. This is quite a list of our churches, and they are at different stages in the process of seeking new pastors. Pray for the churches and those who are assisting them as they seek new pastors.

Let us continue to pray for the leadership of our friends in the North American Baptist Fellowship at is part of the Baptist World Alliance. They are seeking to make decisions about their input into the nomination of a Vice-president from Baptists in North America to join with the other Vice-presidents from the various continents and to serve the BWA over the next five years. Give thanks for the careful thought that this group is giving to the selection and nomination of this Vice-president.

Now is the time of preparation that the staff, volunteers and many participants with the DCBC are having as we get ready for the Annual Gathering of the DCBC. This meeting will occur at Clifton Park Baptist Church once again during October 24-25. Pray for the vendors who will come to the meeting to share their ideas and products with the members of the DCBC. Pray also for those making reports to the DCBC, including the churches who submit reports of their work to the convention and to their fellow churches, as well as those involved in the ministries of the DCBC. Pray also for the speakers that will share with the participants at the convention meetings. Pray about your involvement with the Annual Gathering of the DCBC this October.

We ask your continued prayers and support for the partnership with the Myanmar Baptist Convention, and with the member conventions from Chin, Kachin and Karen states. This partnership is bringing results internationally and among American Baptists across the country. The Chin Christian College is asking for three persons to share with its students this year. Further, the Kachin Christian College and University is considering how many they might seek to have to share. Further, the DCBC is working to hold a conference during September for the refugee churches to help develop the spirituality of their children and youth, in part with Judson Press. Give thanks for all these ministries and for the development of leaders of various types in these efforts.





Give thanks for the work of the Commission for Ordination. We anticipate the full ordination of Mr. Jim Parabochi during the month of September by the Wisconsin Avenue Baptist Church. The Commission for Ordination also looks to complete the recognition through ABC-USA processes of one of our long-term pastors this month. Pray for this work and give thanks for it.

Let us give thanks for the good meeting of the Progressive National Baptist Convention this past month. Many of the pastors of the DCBC participated in this meeting, and large numbers of laity and

volunteers attended various training and seminars during the meeting. Give thanks for the efforts of the PNBC and for the meeting to which they annually invite the DCBC.

Let us pray for Dr. John Lee of the John Leland Center for Theological Studies (JLC). JLC has been a partner with the DCBC for at least 20 years now. The new President of JLC is Dr. William Smith, one a staff member of DCBC and later the pastor of Riverside Baptist Church. Pray for both the school and Dr. Smith as they minister throughout the DC metropolitan area. We are inviting Dr. John Lee to share with the pastors and ministers of the DCBC during our Annual Gathering specifically on the topic of "Mission." Pray for Dr. Lee as he prepares and also as he participates in volunteer missionary efforts in Korea.

We spoke of the passing of Rev. Jerry Buckner in our last prayer newsletter. Many D.C. Baptists met together in early August at University Baptist Church in College Park, MD. There we celebrated how God had worked through Rev. Buckner's life to assist students both across the country and at the University of MD. Remember to give thanks for his past ministry, to pray for his family and to pray for our current minister to students at Gallaudet University.

Let us continue to pray for our retired pastors. One of these who touched base with DCBC this past month is Dr. Bill Moyer, formerly of Hillandale Baptist Church. Let us give thanks for the ministry of Rev. Carlton Veazey who will publish a book this month. Pray also for Rev. Paul Clark, a former interim pastor to many churches and also a former staff member as he endures illness at this time. Continue to pray for the efforts which Rev. Gerald Martin is making to enlist retired pastors into support ministries within the DCBC.

Let us remember to pray for the new graduates from the seminaries who are now seeking ministries within the churches. There is a group young people who are seeking opportunities for ministry. This is good news in the long term for churches that are seeking new pastors, although few of these new graduates are seasoned enough to take on the churches that have pastoral needs. Still, the fact that God still is calling young people into the ministry is good news for the churches who seek leadership now or in the future. There is a small registration fee for this which almost all our members can bear. This meeting brings together Baptist leaders from across Canada and the United States and shares best practices with them so that they might use these in their own settings. Further, the meeting provides fellowship for members and leaders of Baptist groups living on our continent. Pray for General Secretary Jeremy Bell as he work to bring these efforts together.
