From the Desk of the Executive Director/Minister By Rev. Dr. Robert D. Cochran

Identity and Integrity

This is a time of change for the D.C. Baptist Whenever change comes, it is Convention. important to look for ways that others will lead in the future. Today some hear often the phrase, "Ok, Boomer!" It may well be that this article falls into that category, for I was born in 1954. observation of leadership, both currently and across the decades, reveals to me that there are two critically important aspects of leadership: identity and integrity.

Dictionaries define integrity as uprightness of character or honesty. It is difficult for me to imagine anyone being effective in leadership without those characteristics. Such is true whether one speaks of leadership of a small group within a church or that of either a single congregation or a group of congregations. Indeed, many see that a lack of uprightness of character and honesty undermines anyone's leadership. The faults begun under such unsavory practices grow larger within a group, subverting one's attempts to lead, eventually leading to a unnecessary crisis. People cannot plan nor can they support willingly any leader that does not have integrity of character and honesty when leading others. My prayer for D.C. Baptists as well as all in metropolitan Washington is that D.C. Baptists will both find a leader of integrity and follow the characteristics of that leader as they share the Good News throughout our area.

Integrity of character also depends upon a person's self-knowledge or a group's self-awareness.

I pity both persons confused in their own identities, not knowing who they are, as well as those who have built their identities upon something false, something other than the grace of God we find in Christ Jesus. They have no chance for effective leadership. So often, we see in the DCBC, within our churches and within our city, leaders who confuse themselves, missing God's blessing of relationship, merely functioning in socially acceptable roles. I certainly believe that the only identity upon which one can properly live is both that of a follower of Jesus Christ and through that relationship a friend of God. Without a clear identity, one cannot live in integrity.

Integrity and identity are also important for groups, those who understand who they are and who they have become. For that reason, I recently submitted a manuscript to our Board of Directors of the DCBC, a manuscript named Baptists on the Potomac. I pray that this work will assist D.C. Baptists realize our past experiences which helped to make us into the diverse group we are today. Our identity together, both in victories and in failures, will help us live with integrity into the future, leading through Christ our beloved community in metropolitan Washington.

We give thanks for the Board of Directors meeting and Orientation to new members of the Board and to new members of the Standing Committees of the D.C. Baptist Convention. The DCBC has a new President, Dr. Donald Kelly, and a new Vice-president, Dr. Ella Redfield now serving alongside the Recording Secretary, Ms. Gail Lacy. We give thanks for these officers. We also are glad to be welcoming six new Board member and additional committee members to the work of the DCBC. These groups had their first meeting on Saturday, February 1. We give thanks for that meeting, and let us pray for the work of these groups in the present and coming years.

One of the items on the agenda of the Board of Directors meeting was the gift from Robert Cochran to the DCBC of a new book, <u>Baptists on the Potomac: A Historical Analysis of the Columbia Association of Baptist Churches, 1877-1937</u>. The hope is that this work will help D.C. Baptists to discover or to remember their past so that they might build on it to be what God desires for them to be in the future. More than likely the book will be available first through the internet. Perhaps in a few years, it may become available in printed form. Give thanks to God for the history of DC Baptists and pray for the continued efforts of Baptists in the Washington, D.C. metropolitan area.

Remember also to pray for the Search Team of the DCBC that is seeking the next Executive Director/ Minister. Mrs. Charlotte Peddicord is leading this team, and we hear that they are making good, if not excellent, progress in their task. Pray for this group as it works through the curriculum vitae and statements of the prospective applicants. Pray that God will lead the group to the next Executive Director/Minister who the DCBC needs.

We request your prayers concerning some of our fellow workers. Miss Gloria Grogan retired from the DCBC in about 2005. She served for many years at the Director of the Baptist Women within the DCBC and started many other ministries during her time here, including the beloved Ministry on the Mall. We were saddened to hear that Miss Grogan, having relocated to North Carolina, recently experienced a heart attack and a stroke. Pray for her in the recovery of her health and in a coming surgery. Another note of sadness came in learning that both Mrs. Janie Archer, a long-time volunteer who served the DCBC, and also Mrs. Ida Lindsay recently went to be with the Lord. Janie, a long-term member and staff of National Baptist Memorial Church, certainly is cared for by God, but her loss is noted by her son Rev. Bill Archer and his family. Ms. Lindsay worked across many years with the Older Adult Team and was a member of Mt. Jezreel Baptist Church.

Pray for our continued efforts to reach out to work as partners with Foundations. We give thanks that last year the DCBC received some \$220,000 in grants to be used in work for 2020. We know that some of our churches also received grants directly, one which received over \$200,000. Therefore, we are thankful that our pursuit of grants and our preparation of grant writers is working well. Give thanks to God. Each should also know that DCBC is leading other Baptists to recognize these partnership opportunities to work with Foundations. We give thanks also that the giving to the DCBC this past year was at the level of \$264,054 (not including monies given to other Baptist causes, the whole giving totaling \$415,000). The fact that DCBC received \$264,054 last year sets the goal for grant writing by the DCBC this year at that same amount. Pray for us, especially Mrs. Fam Chock, Dr. Robert Cochran and Rev. Andre Towner as we work to secure grants at that level. We also give thanks for the giftedness of Fam and Andre. Give thanks to God generally for the generous provision of support by which we are . . . working together where our city and the world follow and glorify God.




We also should note that Mrs. Fam Chock is offering her services to assist congregations to write grants and is working currently on several projects that include different churches. Pray for her in this work as she continues to assist churches secure grants and more importantly for her work as bookkeeper. Give thanks for the progress that DCBC is making in this ministry.

We need to pray for the staff as they experience in the next month their reviews of the work, which we do annually. This is simply a normal part of the process of the DCBC, but it gives the staff the opportunity to pause and to reflect on their ministries and on what God is doing through them. We give thanks that the staff is working well within and

among the churches, discovering new ways to express Christ in our midst while being on mission in this metropolitan area. This time of reflection and evaluation also opens the door for our planning for the next year, setting new objectives and goals for the staff, for our areas and for the convention at large. Pray for God's Spirit and wisdom to lead us during these times of reflection and preparation.

One of the great items for which you prayed last month was the trip to Hakha in Chin State of Myanmar (Burma). Three persons went to Hakha, making a dangerous trip during a time of international unrest and of contagion. We give thanks that all three returned unharmed by such challenges. Further, we taught 58 students at the Chin Christian University in the following areas: Women's Studies, Baptist History and Identity and Reconciliation. The Hakha Baptist Association, a group that requests still other visits in the future, to assist both their students and the pastors of the Association, also received the three. Praise God for the mission outreach that follows in the tradition of Luther Rice and the Judsons, through which Baptists in Washington are on mission for Christ is far away Asia. Pray as well for the Burma Work Group and for those involved in these effort, as well as all the ministry efforts mentioned earlier.



Reverend Donald R. Kelly serves as the Senior Pastor of the Olive Branch Community Church. A native of Keithville, Louisiana, Rev. Kelly was licensed and preached his first sermon at Shiloh Baptist Church in Plainfield, New Jersey. After serving three years as Associate Minister at Shiloh, Rev. Kelly served as Associate Pastor at St. Stephens Baptist Church, Washington, DC, for approximately two years and Youth Pastor at The People's Community Baptist Church for two years. In 1991 when his career took the family to California, Rev. Kelly united with Star Light Baptist Church in Santa Ana, where he was ordained and became an Associate Pastor. While serving in that role, he simultaneously served as a Lay Minister at Mission Hills Church in Mission Viejo. After returning to the Washington Metropolitan Area in 2000, he and his family reunited with The People's Community Baptist Church where he served as the Family Life, Pastoral Care and Saturday Church Minister. Later, he became the interim Senior Pastor of the church until the spirit led him to begin the Olive Branch Community Church in October 2006.

As the founder and senior pastor of Olive Branch, Rev. Kelly is realizing his vision of a church that changes lives by creating a community of committed, compassionate believers and disciples for Christ. Since the founding of the church, the membership has grown, ministries established, property acquired, and a church rectory dedicated.

Rev. Kelly received his graduate degree in 1978 from Idaho State University in Pocatello, Idaho. He also holds a Master of Arts in Theology from Fuller Theological Seminary in Pasadena, California. Rev. Kelly serves on the Montgomery Hospice Board, the John LeLand Theological Seminary Board and the Ministers' Advisory Board at Howard University Hospital. In March 2009, he was appointed President of the Black Ministers Conference of Montgomery County.

In 1974, Rev. Kelly married the former Brenda S.
Washington and they were blessed with four daughters.
Their family has expanded to include two son-in-laws and two grandsons.

There are times that I fear the people of our city. Like the ones described above, some cause me to walk a little faster after dark. They seem to be predators, even if they are not, even when they are simply minding their own business. How my fears affect my perception of those I fear!

Perhaps some real predators are not those on the street but rather are those who work around me. They may be clothed in the

finest threads, but they, too, wander around in search of their food. They affect my life negatively by taking advantage, or they affect the lives of thousands through seeking their personal gain. Perhaps I have the chance of being a predator, as well.

God, save me from the predators and be my refuge, for I can as easily become a growling dog as I can be hurt by one.




Celebrating Seasoned Saints



D.C. Baptists are a people focusing on the mission of Christ. We have eleven churches among us made up of immigrants from Myanmar. These friends provide open doors to work among three people groups—the Chins, the Kachins and the Karens—where we worked in 2019. These funds will continue to help Baptists (pastors, leaders and seminary students), extending their ministries though teaching in the areas of Agriculture, Practical Theology and Social Work. Some of the funds will also be used to strengthen teaching efforts in the refugee camps and Sunday Schools among the Kachin people of Northern Burma.





The Interfaith Council of Metropolitan Washington (IFC) is seeking a new Executive Director to help the IF continue its mission of creating an inclusive community of diverse faiths in our nation's capital that is focused on the values that unite us and the distinctions that make each faith unique.

Described by the Washington Post as "one of the most dynamic, diverse inter-religious coalitions in the United States, "the InterFaith Conference of Metropolitan Washington celebrates its 35th anniversary in 2013. The IFC engages 11 faith communities in the Nation's Capital region to promote interreligious communication, mutual understanding, and a sense of community. The member faith communities of the IFC are the Baha'i, Buddhist, Hindu, Islamic, Jain, Jewish, Latter-day Saints, Protestant, Roman Catholic, Sikh, and Zoroastrian faith communities of metropolitan Washington.

The IFC celebrates and honors religious diversity, while seeking to identify and advance those values that all of the member faith communities share. The IFC works through the sponsorship of large and small-group dialogues, the presentation of concerts and lectures, the publication of resource materials, the dissemination of public statements, institution-building, networking, and the sponsorship of annual awards for interfaith bridge-builders.

Over the years, the IFC's activities and agenda have responded to the needs and priorities of its expanding membership of faith communities. When, for example, the faith communities saw a need to serve the region's hungry people, the IFC helped found the Capital Area Food Bank. When service providers were faced with opposition to their location within residential neighborhoods, the IFC created a coalition called the Campaign for New Community to foster more mutually supportive relationships.

Today, IFC's initiatives include:

- Creating and disseminating "Strengthening Teaching About Religion (STAR), a high school curricular resource used by social studies and world religion teachers.
- Publishing the vital Emergency Food, Shelter, and Health Care Directory to enable community organizations to connect people in need with relevant service providers throughout the region.
- Empowering the next generation of interfaith leaders by sponsoring the annual DC Young Adult Faith Leaders Summit.
- Providing a supportive voice for religious communities that are affected by disaster, discrimination, restrictions on religious practices, or vandalism.
- Providing a religious leadership on environmental sustainability through IFC's program affiliated,
 Greater Washington Interfaith Power & Light.
 - Promoting interfaith understanding through dialogues on a variety of topics and in a variety of formats.

With a successful transition to a new Executive Director, the IFC will continue to build on its historic legacy, serving the diverse community of metropolitan Washington.
