From the Desk of the Executive Director/Minister

This month we celebrate women; last month we celebrated men. May is a good month to celebrate women, for it is during May that our nation honors many women on Mother's Day. Schools and universities often plan their graduations during this period, giving families and the women within them the opportunity to swell with pride as younger loved ones complete their educations. We know that women are essential for many reasons; most clearly they are elemental to the survival of our species! Who among us did not have some woman who became our mother, often physically, sometimes emotionally? Females are essential and rightly honored as creations of God.

The roles of women continue to change across the ages, as the society develops and carries new expectations. The primary role for women was once that of bringing children to life and caring for them as they matured. In our own society, that role changed after the War Between the States, for during those terrible year women took on many roles in the absence of soldiers at battle. (Today's changes in women's roles are nothing new.) Americans began to realize that women had all kinds of essential gifts and abilities, once simply overlooked. Women began to seek additional education. Ultimately, untold millions have taken up professions, beginning to work away from their homes. Today working women continue to grow in participation in the economy as well as the society.

Women are essential to the Church of Christ and have been so since the time of Jesus. Women were among the first believers in Jesus, the first disciples of Jesus and the first supporters of Jesus—even serving as the first to share the Good News of His resurrection. The early Church freed women from the chains of first century culture, noting that women believers were equal in the eyes of God, making up the unity of Christ (Galatians 3:28-29). Those efforts later were forgotten only to be discovered again in recent years. The ministry by women is one of the primary features of Christian Churches across the ages. This is no less true today.

Women are essential to the life of the Church and the lives of us all. Let us celebrate together the gift of women and look carefully to them so that we may more fully see the continuing revelation of God.


Welcome to May!

There is more to us than we know.

If we can be made to see it,

Perhaps for the rest of our lives

We will be unwilling to settle for less."

These are the words of Kurt Hahn, a German-born Jewish educator who was forced to leave Germany due to his criticism of Nazis. They are a fitting introduction to this correspondence. Because this is not a letter about being more or less than another person. Good, better or best, you can let that rest.

I hope that my words rise above the fray of fickle allegiances and faulty gender comparisons. We were not created to live in competition but in community, not as rivals but siblings. So, this is not a jab from the women's side in the "battle of the sexes" but a nudge to remind women that you don't have to fight to belong.

Your existence is not an act of defiance. "The earth is the Lord's" and consequently, there is always room for you (Psalm 24.1). You were created for this world, at this time and in this body because God purposed it. Thus, you are not alien, ahead of your time or the reason for the attacks you suffer, the mistreatments you endure, the injustices you face. My dear sister, your body has not failed you—we have.

And there is no glass ceiling in God's kingdom. You need not be afraid of stones.

My dear sister, lift your head because there is nothing about being a woman that you should be ashamed of. Your body is not to blame for its subpar treatment. You enter the world as you should. Created by God, your flesh is tagged the same as everyone else's. Instead, we must rise to meet you and greet you with all the dignity, honor and love that you deserve. Because you are more than we know or could ever fathom.

Jessica Goodfellow offers these words, which serve as a fitting summation on the matter. She titles it "The Invention of Fractions" and says,

The whole numbers, the counting numbers.


It took humankind to need less than this;

Problems on your job?

Dear Sister,

Dennis C. Golden, President Emeritus of Fontbonne University in St. Louis, once recalled a visit years ago with a friend who was at the helm of another university. During their conversation, Golden's friend described her role as college president in terms of three specific functions.

"Basically," she said, "I get up every morning and I do three things:

Absorb chaos; give back calm; provide hope."

As ministers of the gospel, you and I recognize something of our own calling in those words—especially the part about absorbing chaos. Serving Jesus in the church and in the world involves the inevitable sponging up of all kinds of ugliness and pain: Anger. Gossip. Secrets. Shame. Betrayal. Pettiness. Addiction. And, as most of us have discovered along the way, absorbing chaos takes a very personal toll.

Absorb chaos. A person can sop up only so much ugliness before her or his soul begins to turn rancid. Maybe that college president should consider adding a fourth bullet point to her job description: "Wring out sponge." There are plenty of good sponge-wringing avenues: prayer, worship, meditation, exercise, therapy, good friends, etc. Why do this? For all kinds of reasons, but I'll name two:


First: God has given you and me a name and it is beloved, not beleaguered. You and I were meant for more than a depleted, soggy half-life.

And second: God has given us a name and it is *creature*, not *Creator*. Christ already absorbed the sin and chaos of the world—opened his pores to receive the poison and shuddered as it killed him. Why in the world would we feel the need to let it kill us, too?

So for God's sake, and your own—lift up your sponges. (Say it with me: *We lift them up to the Lord!*) Lift them up and squeeze till your knuckles turn white. This is a faithful act.







SINC COLLEGE DAY By Robert Cochran CELEBRATION



More than 150 D.C. Baptists gathered on April 28, 2018 to celebrate the culture of the people and of the land of Myanmar. Myanmar is the homeland in Southeast Asia of the Burmese and also of multiple other ethnic groups. The purpose of the festival was to introduce D.C. Baptists to the partnership effort under development with

the Myanmar Baptist Convention (MBC). The partnership is to focus on the Chins, the Kachins and the Karens living in Myanmar. Some efforts to help the Baptists in Myanmar have begun already, even though the DCBC awaits the full endorsement of the partnership by the MBC.

The Burmese Work Group, a group of leaders working to develop the partnership with the MBC, planned and carried out the cultural event. The group hopes that such a celebration will become an annual feature on the calendar of the DCBC. This group and its efforts are helping DCBC to fulfill its nature as an International Missional Network.

Luther Rice Memorial Baptist Church under the pastoral leadership of Rev. John Cheek hosted warmly the gathering. Rev. Cheek at one point expressed concern that so many were present that he feared the building occupancy permit might be exceeded. Eighteen congregations affiliated with the DCBC were represented at the event enjoyed by all, 11 English-speaking churches

and 7 congregations made up of immigrants from Myanmar. One employee of the American Baptist Home Missions Societies, who is also a member of a DCBC-related congregation, was also present, giving the gathering a national prominence.

The cultural experience included music and dance performed by members of the immigrant churches with ties to Myanmar. All enjoyed a light meal of varied dishes prepared by those who once immigrants now see themselves as part of the DCBC family. Some of the pastors of the immigrant churches noted that they enjoyed the fellowship now often lost due to both distance and the rapid pace of life in metropolitan Washington.

MINISTRY ON THE MALL


